Funding: From one to three years, up to £5,000 per year, can cover running costs or project revenue costs

Deadline: 1st Friday of January / May / September

* this fund is open to organisations in the ancient Diocese of Durham which covers Hartlepool, Stockton, Darlington, County Durham, Sunderland, Gateshead, South Tyneside, North Tyneside, Newcastle upon Tyne and Northumberland

The Hospital was founded and endowed primarily as an almshouse charity. Surplus income is distributed in the form of grants for the relief of need, hardship or distress to charitable organisations.

The Trust aims to support charities working in the lower profile areas of work that reach people who are on the edges of society; as an example, the Trust has supported organisations that work with asylum seekers, prisoners' families and people with drug problems.

Applications are assessed against the following criteria:

- Whether the work enhances the ability of the individual or the community to achieve self-determination Whether the work can be seen to directly benefit people who are disadvantaged
- The evidence of the need for the project
- The ability of the applicant organisation to deliver the service

During the financial year ending 31st October 2009 the Trust awarded 103 grants; most of these were between £1,000 and £2,000.

The Trust does not have an application form. Grant applications should be made in writing and should consist of no more than two sides of A4 describing the project, the need it is to meet and how it is to be delivered. This should be accompanied by the latest set of audited accounts and / or annual report. Grant applicants are asked to ensure that they put the correct postage on their application.

The following will not be considered:

- Capital works or appeals
- Education, travel, or adventure projects
- Training, conferences and feasibility studies
- Medical equipment and related projects

Breaks 4 Kids is a charitable fund founded and supported by the Youth Hostel Association (YHA). It helps to fund youth groups and school trips for children from low income households, by contributing towards the cost of their YHA accommodation and food. Young people should be travelling as part of an organised group, be under the age of 18, entitled to free school dinners or from a low income household. Groups can organise their own trip or choose from a selection of YHA School Trip packages. They can apply for up to five nights funding. To apply groups should:

- decide what activities they want to do and where they want to stay
- contact the hostel manager directly to make a provisional booking
- apply for funding and then, if successful, contact the hostel manager to confirm and pay (the hostel will deduct the amount of the grant)

The Fund supports tree planting projects starting in 2011 during National Tree Week (26th November to 4th December). Children (under 16) must be actively engaged. Applicants must provide evidence that they can meet at least 25% of the funds needed. If they are doing the planting, one day of volunteer skilled labour may be included as part of this at £50 per day pro rata. Eligible costs include the cost of the trees and the necessary supports and aids to establishment (e.g. stakes, ties, guards, fertilizer). Labour for planting is not included except where it is impossible for volunteers to undertake.

Deadline: 30th April 2011

The fund supports the provision and restoration of pipe organs in the British Isles. An application can be made only if and when all of the following conditions have been met:

- the project is for the main organ in the church
- a fund has been set up and at least half the amount required (including VAT if applicable) has been raised
- a contract has been signed with the organ builder and a starting date fixed
- a faculty (if applicable) has been granted

The Trustees may attach importance to an approach which shows respect for the instrument's artistic character.

Places People Play is a 2012 Olympic and Paralympic legacy sports programme to be delivered by Sport England. There are three parts to the programme:

Places

- **Inspired Facilities**

- For upgrading sports facilities: to modernise, extend or modify
- Clubs, community and voluntary sector groups and councils will be able to apply for grants of £25,000 - £150,000
- £50m will be available to improve 1000 sports facilities
- Five funding rounds will run from April 2011 until 2014 / 2015

- **Protecting Playing Fields**
 - £10m will be made available to protect playing fields
 - The first of five rounds running until 2014 / 2015 will open in January 2011
- **Iconic Facilities**
 - The existing Sustainable Facilities fund has been enhanced with this fund to create local beacons for grassroots sport by supporting innovative large scale multi-sport facility projects that are regionally significant for at least two sports
 - £30m will available through three funding rounds until 2012
 - The deadline for the first round is **16th December 2010**

People - recruiting, training and deploying 40,000 sports leaders as the next generation of sports volunteers to organise and lead grassroots sporting activities. Anyone over 16 can become a sports leader. This programme will **launch in April 2011** with £2m funding. It will run for two years.

Play - giving everyone the chance to participate in sporting activities

- **Gold Challenge**
 - To motivate over 100,000 adults to test themselves in multiple Olympic and Paralympic sports whilst also raising money for charity
 - Gold Challenge is self funding, but £4m of National Lottery Funding will be made available to be invested in the sports delivery system if sports are unable to cope with the increased demand
 - Runs until 31st December 2012
- **Sportivate** - will provide opportunities for teenagers and young adults to receive six weeks of coaching in the sport of their choice and will guide them into regular participation within their community. Sportivate will **launch in April 2011** with £32m funding coming through Sport England

The Trust aims to help veterans who struggle with the transition to civilian life, especially those whose psychological well-being impacts on the quality of their life and others around them. It will support existing organisations that support veterans and families to improve access to services, research, awareness raising and advocacy work. The Trust is intended to become operational by the end of Summer 2011.

North East charitable trusts and foundations' response to cuts

Charitable trusts and foundations in the North East have set out their joint response to the public sector cuts because of concerns about how people and communities may be affected by more limited funding for the voluntary sector. The Community Foundation serving Tyne & Wear and Northumberland has issued a joint statement on behalf of the North East Trust Secretaries Group.

Aimed at the voluntary sector, public bodies and other funders, the statement sets out trusts and foundations' future role in grant-making, leadership and collaborating with public bodies. The key points are:

- North East trusts and foundations have funds available now for grants to voluntary groups. Some can also offer support for training and development
- They don't have resources to fill gaps caused by loss of public sector funding
- As independent bodies they must focus on their charitable purposes. They may not be able to directly replace public funding
- They will encourage others to increase their funding in the North East, support more giving and volunteering, and promote local causes
- They want to contribute to discussions with public sector partners to ensure the best results for North East communities
